Mr. Rumbolt: Thank you, Mr. Clerk. Good afternoon members, members of the public, and people watching on TV.

Mr. Clerk, I MOVE, seconded by the Hon. Member for Kugluktuk, that Joe

Enook, Member for Tununiq, do take the Chair of this House as Speaker.

Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

Speaker (Mr. Enook)(interpretation): Sergeant-at-Arms, I call upon you to raise the mace.

Speaker's Statement

Speaker (interpretation): Please be seated. As Speaker of the Legislative Assembly of Nunavut, I am honoured to welcome our elders, distinguished guests, and visitors to the House for the first sitting of the Fifth Legislative Assembly.

I would like to express my deep appreciation to all members for the trust and confidence that you have placed in me by selecting me to serve as your Speaker.

As your Speaker, I am committed to upholding the rights and privileges of this institution and its members.

All members can be confident that I will fulfill the responsibilities of the Speakership in a manner that is consistent with the office's obligation to demonstrate fairness and impartiality.

Earlier today all Members of this House took their oaths of allegiance and office.

I look forward to working with all of my colleagues in the House and outside of the House during our term of office on behalf of our territory and residents.

I would also like to take this opportunity to publicly thank my constituents in Pond Inlet for their support during the recent election and in past terms.

Being entrusted to represent the constituency of Tununiq has been the greatest honour of my life, and I can assure all residents of Pond Inlet that I will be vigorously advocating for the constituency through the appropriate channels and in the appropriate manner.

While the public out there is listening, I wish to thank my wife for her undying support, and I know that she will always be my foundation while I am Speaker and MLA. Thank you.

The member will formally take his seat at our next sitting once his filing obligations under the *Nunavut Elections Act* have been completed. We look forward to having the member taking his seat.

Opening Address of the Commissioner of Nunavut

Commissioner Nellie Kusugak

(interpretation): Mr. Speaker, elders, Premier, members, and Nunavummiut who are listening to the radio broadcast and watching the televised proceedings, it's unfortunate that the delegates that were supposed to be here haven't arrived, but I would also like to welcome them. Welcome to the First Session of the Fifth Legislative Assembly of Nunavut.

I would first like to congratulate Mr. Enook on his selection as Speaker. As the Speaker, you will be presiding over the Government of Nunavut's mandate. You were elected by 22 Members of the Legislative Assembly. You will also be dealing with the estimates and to provide services to the people of Nunavut.

I would like to congratulate all the elected members. You have been trusted to be in your position and they have placed their confidence in you. They have placed their trust in you to represent them wisely and to properly represent your ridings.

I would also like to congratulate the Premier, Mr. Quassa, and the cabinet members. Since you are the Fifth Legislative Assembly of Nunavut, the people of Nunavut have placed their trust and future with you as the present government and to provide more opportunities to the people of Nunavut. We are working for a brighter future with a solid foundation.

We have to make sure that the deliberations are for the people of Nunavut by dialogue and agreement or consensus. I would also like you to think about who you're representing during your dialogue. It has been the foundation of our ancestors and will be exercised during the Fifth Assembly.

We will also have to decide on the mandate of this government. I urge you to think of our future. During your deliberations, you will be holding office for four years representing the people of Nunavut.

At the next sitting, this government will be working on the capital estimates and the operations and maintenance budget to provide something that will benefit all. You will also be looking at new legislation and amendments to bills. While you are doing that, please make sure that you think of our future. As Members of the Legislative Assembly, you all have a responsibility to properly represent your constituents and for this government to provide the best for the people. Place them as a priority.

I also know that you will be doing all you can to the best of your ability, and that you will be there while Nunavut is growing to ensure that the territory of Nunavut can become stronger. I wish you all a very productive future. I now declare open the First Session of the Fifth Legislative Assembly of Nunavut. Thank you.

I thank you all.

(interpretation ends) Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise today to express my deepest appreciation and gratitude to the people of Iqaluit-Niaqunnguu, whom I am just so very proud to represent in this House.

Mr. Speaker, two months ago those of us who had the honour of serving in the previous Legislative Assembly took the opportunity at our final sitting to offer some reflections at the close of our terms. Those reflections reviewed the work that we have accomplished together and considered the many challenges that are before us still.

Mr. Speaker, over the past two months I have been able to spend a significant amount of time listening to the concerns, dreams, goals, and ideas of the residents of this community.

I very much welcomed the opportunity for dialogue during our recent general election, and I look forward to continuing to do my very best on behalf of the constituency, the community, and this territory as a whole.

Mr. Speaker, elections are a team effort. I am delighted to have the opportunity today to thank my team for the incredible work that they put into our recent success. Mr. Speaker, I want to pay special tribute to a number of people.

My campaign manager, Jane Tagak, kept me organized and on track throughout the campaign. To my financial agent, John Matthews, thank you very much for all your help and support.

Kailey Arreak and my sister, Susan Gardener, spent many hours going door to door with me, fighting the elements and the dogs by the way in putting up signs, going door to door, and putting up my posters.

I would like to thank Opah and Ed Picco for their advice and support, as many other individuals on my team, including Elisapee Ikkidluak, Eva Groves, and Jim Tegler.

I would like to apologize in advance if I forgot anybody, but I don't think I did.

Mr. Speaker, I seek unanimous consent to conclude my statement today.

Speaker (interpretation): Thank you. The member is seeking unanimous consent to conclude her statement. Are there any nays? There are no nays. Ms. Angnakak, you may proceed.

Ms. Angnakak: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Thank you, fellow members.

Mr. Speaker, elections are about choices. We are fortunate to live in a democratic country that affords us the opportunity to make choices about who we entrust with the responsibility to serve in our legislative institutions.

Mr. Speaker, a total of 72 people had the courage to put their names forward during the recent general election and I salute each and every one of them for offering a choice to our voters.

Mr. Speaker, last week's recent leadership forum may have been a long day, but it was a great day.

Having sat and worked closely with you for the past four years, it was my great pleasure to nominate you for the Speakership, an office that I am confident that you will hold with dignity, fairness, and wisdom.

I also want to say that all of our leadership candidates distinguished themselves by their clear and deep commitment to the people of Nunavut, and I am proud to call all of you my colleagues.

Mr. Speaker, although I have to admit that the view from this side of the House may take a little getting used to, I also want to state clearly that I am looking forward to working with all members to address the issues and priorities that are emerging as the focus of our new term. We are a team.

I believe that we have a very strong Assembly, and I am of course very proud at the significant increase in the number of women who are serving in it today. Mr. Speaker, I would like to conclude today by paying public tribute to the family members who are the centre of my life: my husband, Archie; my children, Sharon, Matthew, and Michael; my grandchildren; my sisters, Ann and Susan; and of course my parents, who are not able to be with us here today, Margaret and Michael, whose own lifelong commitment to Nunavut and its extraordinary people have inspired me throughout my life. Member's Statement 005 – 5(1): Reflections on Being Elected to Represent Quttiktuq **Mr. Akeeagok** (interpretation): Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I thank you and also welcome everyone who is following our proceedings and all Nunavummiut.

I give thanks to the people of the Quttiktuq riding for the confidence they have given me to hold this very seat to represent them.

First I would like to praise my late parents, Akeeagok and Ooleesee, for raising me, and all the elders with all the familiar names like Kigutak, Pijamini, Nungaq, Flaherty, Idlout, Akpaleapik, Innualuk, Qaqqasiq, Joseph, Naqitarvik, and those that are no longer here with us who provided me with my namesake, Tuurngaaluk. I thank them all from the bottom of my heart as I can picture them smiling at us.

During my election campaign I visited a number of my constituents' homes and they welcomed me by reminiscing about the times in my youth when I would be seen baiting birds and I was so drenched with seal oil that my clothes shone. Now I am standing here today with this shiny new clothing my mother-in-law made for me and they make me seem as shiny as I was back then, so I am extremely grateful to my mother-in-law who is unable to be here with us.

Within these upcoming four years, 21 members will have to work diligently on our challenges. We have a lot of upcoming opportunities as well as the extreme challenges we face. It is only through cooperative governance that we can accomplish our goals. As well I ask my colleagues to consider visiting the Quttiktuq, where you will receive a warm welcome.

Our elders will be able to welcome you, such as the 97-year-old elder, Qaapik from Arctic Bay or if you go to Resolute Bay, by a sage advisor I continually ask advice from, Mary Kalluk, and if you ever go to Grise Fiord, I have two mentors who taught me a lot, Aksarjuk Ningiuq and Jaypetee.

Speaker (interpretation): Thank you. The member is seeking unanimous consent to conclude his statement. Are there any nays? There are no nays. Please proceed, Mr. Akeeagok.

Mr. Akeeagok (interpretation): Thank you, Mr. Speaker and colleagues, for allowing me to conclude my statement.

As a newly elected minister, I will not be asking a lot of questions in the House, but I do want to assure my constituents that this will not take away the commitment of representing them in this territory.

Due to the high cost of travel, it makes it difficult to see each other on a regular basis, but through technology and radio, communicating with each other makes it possible. I pledge to look into reducing transportation costs.

Our elders are the most precious treasures of this territory, and I often hear people are worried about where they are going to be placed when they are physically challenged.

Those are a couple of areas amongst a number of other priorities that I will be focusing on as the Member for Quttiktuq.

In closing, I would like to especially thank my wife along with my children and extended family and friends. We will ensure that we will make a difference in the next few years successfully and see this fine territory blossom. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

vehicle sank in the sea, and all of my brothers-in-law with the Kaludjak surname passed on. I recall that my nephew, Macpah Kaludjak, has helped me ever since that time, so I commemorate him. Macpah, you are in my thoughts today if you are listening.

To conclude, I thank our elders in Ranking Inlet for their assistance: Alice Kingmeatok, Tommy Tullik, and Violet Twyee. As well, I need to mention my brothers and my maternal uncle, Robert Tatty's descendants, including my namesake uncle's relatives who are descended from Jerome Tattuinee, if they happen to be listening. I also wish to mention Pilakapsi's family, who was another maternal uncle. To all of their descendants, I send them my personal thanks and appreciation.

Lastly I humble myself as we will need to work with you on these issues that are very challenging, and may God provide assistance to us all.

Ms. Sheutiapik (interpretation): Thank you, Mr. Speaker. To the members here, the viewing audience on television, and especially people from Iqaluit-Sinaa, I am able to be here because of your confidence in me.

To my colleagues, I wish you a warm welcome and I want you to feel at home

here in the city. Iqaluit is the only city in Nunavut. Since we are in Nunavut, all of us from the different regions meet here to unite and work together.

I was one of four people visiting people's homes during the campaign: Adamie Itorcheak, with whom I went to high school, Cindy Rennie, who has worked with the government for a number of years, as well as Paul Okalik, who was the incumbent and was first elected.

He called me after the election and I was able to tell him, (interpretation ends) "Paul," I said, "one thing that none of us here today can say," that he had, he was our first Premier. I have to acknowledge our first like Jordin Tootoo making it as the first Inuk in the NHL. I said, "Hats off to you. Nobody can ever take away the fact that you were the first Premier."

I had three foundations, three pillars when I was running and I know that we have heard a lot of it: housing, every person has the right for a safe home, an affordable home; proper accommodations for our elders; employment. We need daycares to ensure that women and families are assisted. We need not just education but training as well. To do any of that, we also have to be healthy.

As I went door to door, I talked about our mental health. I know that I have heard over the last two weeks in training and I had talked about the four I knew: depression, post-traumatic, schizophrenia, and bipolar. Even while going door to door, I learned that there's also anxiety.

People are starting to actually acknowledge that there are mental health issues in our territory, but as we eliminate the stigma, I want to make sure that we have the support for these people who are finally accepting it. To have a home, you need to be employed, but to do any of that, you need to be healthy.

(interpretation) I apologize. I seek unanimous consent to conclude my statement.

I am also remembering my parents. They were originally from Kimmirut but moved here to Iqaluit when the community was just getting established. Sheutiapik was E-71 and my mother was Ningiuraapik, E-72.

I would also like to thank my partner in every way. (interpretation ends) When we went to the bank for a financial agent, the banker said, "You know you're going to have to do deposits and cheques." I looked at the banker and said, "He does that for me every day." He is my everything.

I am honoured that my son was here and most of you know him as my *uummatik*. I take my parenting very seriously.

I look forward to the next four years as colleagues, as family.

To everyone on TV, including Tom from Wisconsin, thank you for calling. People out there are watching. (interpretation) Thank you.
