**Speaker** (Hon. Peter Kilabuk)(interpretation): Good morning. I would like to ask Mr. Curley to say the opening prayer. Mr. Curley.

**Speaker** (interpretation): Good morning, Premier, Ministers, Members, and our visitors in the Gallery. Member for Cambridge Bay, Mr. Peterson.

**Mr. Peterson**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker and good morning. Mr. Speaker, pursuant to Rule 18(1), I seek unanimous consent of the House to proceed directly to Item 19 on the Orders of the Day. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

**Speaker** (interpretation): Thank you, Mr. Peterson. The member is seeking unanimous consent to proceed directly to Item 19. Are there any nays? There are no nays. We will proceed to Item 19.

Item 19. Consideration in Committee of the Whole of Bills and Other Matters. Bills 22, 23, 24, and 25. (interpretation ends) In accordance with the authority provided to me by Motion 4 - 2(4), the Committee of the Whole will stay in session until it reports itself out.

(interpretation) Members, I ask that you remain in your seats and Mr. Arreak will be the Chair of Committee of the Whole.

#### Item 19: Consideration in Committee of the Whole of Bills and Other Matters

**Chairman** (Mr. Arreak)(interpretation): I would like to call the committee meeting to order. (interpretation ends) In Committee of the Whole, we have the following items to deal with: Bills 22, 23, 24, and 25. What is the wish of the committee? Mr. Kattuk.

**Mr. Kattuk**: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. We wish to continue with Bill 23 and return to the Department of Health and Social Services. Following the completion of Bill 23, we will then proceed to review Bills 22, 24, and 25. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

**Chairman** (interpretation): Thank you, Mr. Kattuk. (interpretation ends) Does the committee agree we deal with Health and Social Services?

Some Members: Agreed.

# Bill 23 – Appropriation (Operations & Maintenance) Act, 2008-2009 – Consideration in Committee – Health & Social Services

**Chairman**: Minister of Health, (interpretation) would you like to have your witnesses with you at the witness table?

Hon. Leona Aglukkaq: Yes.

**Chairman** (interpretation): Thank you. Does the committee agree to bring in the witnesses?

**Some Members**: Agreed.

Chairman (interpretation): Sergeant-at-Arms, please escort the witnesses in.

Welcome. Minister, for the record, please introduce your officials. Minister.

**Hon. Leona Aglukkaq** (interpretation): Good morning. (interpretation ends) To my left is Alex Campbell, the Deputy Minister for Health and Social Services, and to my right is Raj Downe, the Assistant Deputy Minister for Health and Social Services. Thank you.

**Chairman** (interpretation): Thank you, Minister. Welcome to the Chamber. We were on page H-7 in the Main Estimates of the Department of Health and Social Services. Mr. Tapardjuk.

# Committee Motion 013 - 2(4): Addition of \$1,000,000 to Health and Social Services 2008-09 Main Estimates

**Hon. Louis Tapardjuk** (interpretation): Thank you. While we're here, I move that \$1 million be added to the 2008-09 Main Estimates of the Department of Health and Social Services 2008-09 under Treatment Branch, Mr. Chairman.

**Chairman** (interpretation): Thank you. The motion is in order. The member would like to move that \$1 million be added to the 2008-09 Main Estimates of the Department of Health and Social Services. (interpretation ends) To the motion. Mr. Tootoo.

**Mr. Tootoo**: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I think that it's good that they're putting an extra \$1 million in there. However, I still have concerns regarding the amount. Now, we have before us a Supplementary Appropriation Bill that's looking at putting another close to \$4.5 million in for medical travel, which would bring the revised amounts for 2007-08 up

to about \$49 million. With this extra \$1 million, it only brings the medical travel amount up to a little over \$44 million. So I'm just wondering whether it's sufficient or not.

I know the minister, in speaking to the motion to defer the department, had indicated that the best numbers that they could go with is what they actually spent the year before and here we're seeing it's still about \$2 million or \$3 million less than what they actually spent in this fiscal year. So I would like maybe the sponsoring minister, the Minister of Finance, or the Health Minister to speak to the motion and explain how they only came up with \$1 million. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

**Chairman**: Thank you, Mr. Tootoo. To the motion. Question has been called. All those in favour of the motion, raise your hand, please. Against. The motion is carried.

Branch Summary. Treatment. Total Operations and Maintenance, to be Voted. \$138,236,000. Does the committee agree? Mr. Curley.

**Mr. Curley**: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I have some comments. The minister earlier indicated, I believe it was last week, that she has pretty much responded to the tender that was put out for medical travel contracts and the RPF that was issued, RFP #2007-52 Medical Travel on Scheduled Airlines in the Territory of Nunavut's Kitikmeot, Kivalliq and Baffin regions. I think there was some information that was provided to the Committee of the Whole for the Baffin region, but the minister, in her reply to me some time last week, indicated that the Kivalliq was one region that did not have a medical travel contract with the airlines.

I wonder if she is prepared to indicate to the House now exactly what the result of this tender that was released some time last fall is and the closing date for that time was December 7; I believe you issued it on October 30, 2007. So my question to the minister is: is she prepared to announce to the House who is awarded with the medical travel contract in the Kivalliq region? Thank you.

**Chairman**: Thank you, Mr. Curley. Minister Aglukkaq.

**Hon. Leona Aglukkaq**: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. The member is correct; when I did state that there was no contract in place in the previous years, there was no contract in the Kivalliq region.

In terms of where we are at with the process, from what I understand from CG&S, we are waiting for the signed copies of the contracts to come back from the airlines. That's where we are at right now. So the RFP process, from what I understand, in following the procurement procedure process, is still open until those signed contracts are returned from the airlines. Thank you.

Chairman: Thank you, Minister. Mr. Curley.

**Mr. Curley**: Thank you. In view of the fact, Mr. Chairman, that there can be quite a tremendous economic impact to the regions, once all the reviews and more information are obtained from those airlines that are participating in the bidding process, or responding to the tender or the RFP, will the minister assure this House that whatever happens that she will not award the contract to a single carrier? Thank you.

Chairman: Thank you, Mr. Curley. Minister Aglukkaq.

**Hon. Leona Aglukkaq**: Mr. Chairman, the whole process of the RFP process has taken place and once all that is finalized, I will gladly brief the members on the decisions. It is not final at this point in time for me to make comments but they're respecting the process that's in place for tendering contracts. I can't speak to the details of it but I would be happy to release the information once everything is finalized and the RFP process is closed. Thank you.

Chairman: Thank you, Minister. Mr. Curley.

**Mr. Curley**: Thank you. Mr. Chairman, it would be useful to have that information but that is not what I'm asking. I'm asking the minister responsible for signing the new medical travel contract with the airline from the Kivalliq region to Manitoba. I'm asking the minister or her colleagues that they will not award the contract to a single carrier. Thank you.

Chairman: Thank you, Mr. Curley. Minister Aglukkaq.

**Hon. Leona Aglukkaq**: Again, Mr. Chairman, for the record, there is a process that's in place for the Request for Proposal process. Each proposal is evaluated on the basis of each merit and decisions are based on that. Once that information is available, I will announce the airlines that have been awarded the contract and it is not one airline for Nunavut. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

Chairman: Thank you, Minister. Mr. Curley.

**Mr.** Curley: Mr. Chairman, the Minister of Transportation indicated and stated to the House more than once here that the government is in support of the competition. Does that also apply to the medical travel contracts? Thank you.

Chairman: Thank you, Mr. Curley. Minister Aglukkaq.

Hon. Leona Aglukkaq: The medical travel contract is a government program, so yes.

Chairman: Thank you. Mr. Curley.

**Mr.** Curley: Thank you. So whatever happens in the Kivalliq region, there will be a competition, that the medical travel contract will likely be split amongst the airlines in

order to ensure the competition and have less economic impact on flights to the region? Thank you.

Chairman: Thank you, Mr. Curley. Minister Aglukkaq.

**Hon. Leona Aglukkaq**: Again, Mr. Chairman, when the contracts are finalized, I will be prepared to release the information to discuss the details of it. At this point in time, I can't release that information. So once they're finalized, I will be happy to discuss the issues with him. Thank you.

Chairman: Thank you, Minister. Mr. Curley.

**Mr. Curley**: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. Whatever happens, if the medical travel contract is not split among the more dominant carrier as well as the smaller one, there could be a very serious negative economic impact. So is the minister saying to this committee that she will not negatively impact the air travel services as a result of the contract being issued in the Kivalliq? Is the minister prepared to confirm that to the committee? Thank you.

Chairman: Thank you, Mr. Curley. Minister Aglukkaq.

**Hon. Leona Aglukkaq**: Mr. Chairman, what I have been saying here is that once the contracts are finalized, I will be prepared to release the information. I cannot answer the member's questions until those processes are complete. Thank you.

Chairman: Thank you, Minister. Mr. Curley.

**Mr. Curley**: Thank you. I welcome that information but it's still unrelated to what I'm saying. There could be a serious air travel disruption if the contract is not split and therefore, I'm trying to get some commitment from the minister as it may be too late for this committee or for the MLAs impacted after the fact.

So I'm trying to get some assurance from the minister that whatever happens, it will improve the air service in the Kivalliq because medical travel is a major component of successful air services in the region. So is the minister saying to us that she will not unfairly impact the current air travel in Kivalliq? Thank you.

**Chairman** (interpretation): Thank you, Mr. Curley. According to our Rules, we must not pose hypothetical questions in Committee of the Whole. It's at your discretion to respond. Minister Aglukkaq.

**Hon. Leona Aglukkaq**: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. Thank you for the clarification. What I have been saying, in response to the member's question, is that once the RFP process is complete, I will be prepared to share the information with the member as it relates to medical travel contracts for the Nunavut territory.

As a government, we said that we encourage competition. We use the guiding principles of our government to ensure that we use a fair process for allocating the contract through the RFP process and we will be announcing the results of the RFP process when the contracts have been signed and received by the Department of CG&S. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

Chairman: Thank you, Minister. Mr. Curley.

**Mr. Curley**: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I know it's difficult sometimes, Mr. Chairman, to get a clear understanding of what the policy of the government is, even though the Minister of Transportation said that they believe in fair competition in Nunavut. When it's actually applied with some of the contracts that each department has, that particular direction or goal is normally not fully realized.

I'm trying to get a clear commitment from the minister that competition will continue to exist in the Kivalliq region as a result of this one tender, which is a major one and there are no other contracts like this one within the government. So how long will it take to actually sign this medical contract for the Kivalliq region? Thank you.

**Chairman**: Thank you, Mr. Curley. Minister Aglukkaq.

**Hon. Leona Aglukkaq**: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. From what I understand from CG&S, the contracts have been couriered to the airlines and we have not received the signed copies back from them. Hopefully, by next week, we will have received those contracts. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

**Chairman**: Thank you, Minister. Mr. Curley.

**Mr. Curley**: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I need clarification from the minister. Did she indicate that the contract documents have been forwarded to more than one airline? Thank you.

**Chairman**: Thank you, Mr. Curley. Minister Aglukkaq.

**Hon. Leona Aglukkaq**: Again, the RFP process is for the Nunavut territory. The contracts have been distributed to the airlines for the medical travel contract for the Nunavut territory and we're waiting for those to come back before we can announce them. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

**Chairman**: Thank you, Minister. Mr. Curley.

**Mr.** Curley: I appreciate the clarification. I think the minister indicated earlier that the contract documents have been forwarded to them. Did I understand her correctly? Thank you.

**Chairman**: Thank you, Mr. Curley. Minister Aglukkaq.

**Hon. Leona Aglukkaq**: Again, the contract processing is still open for the Nunavut territory and from what I understand from CG&S, they have been sent and we're waiting for the signed copies to come back. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

Chairman: Thank you, Minister. Mr. Curley.

**Mr. Curley**: I understand from your response to my earlier question of clarification that contract documents have been forwarded to them. Have you received one or more signed contracts back? As they likely will not sign all of them in one day, have you received at least one or two? Thank you.

Chairman: Thank you, Mr. Curley. Minister Aglukkaq.

**Hon. Leona Aglukkaq**: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I understand the member with what he's getting at here but we have not received anything, which is why we cannot speak to that RFP process. It's open until the paperwork has been signed is what I have been saying and I'm waiting to hear back from CG&S the confirmation that they have received. So once that information is processed and finalized, I will be notified and then I will be happy to announce the information to the member.

As it is right now, the RFP process is in place and we're following the procedures of the contracting procedures that we follow and respecting that, the RFP process is still open until we receive the signed contracts. So that's where it's at, Mr. Chairman, I believe I have answered the member's question more than once. Thank you.

**Chairman**: Thank you, Minister. Mr. Curley.

**Mr. Curley**: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. Yes, that's useful to understand. I'm not 100 percent sure whether that RFP is still open because the closing date, as far as I have it, it says October 30, 2007. The evaluation may be taking a lot longer than that, and so on, and I believe that's what is happening, and the government has offered its service requirements to a number of airlines. My next question is: how many airlines responded to the Kivalliq RFP when it was issued in October? And actually, they did close on December 7, 2007. Thank you.

**Chairman**: Thank you, Mr. Curley. Minister Aglukkaq.

**Hon. Leona Aglukkaq**: I believe that's a question for the CG&S Department that manages the contracting procedures. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

Chairman: Thank you, Minister. Minister Brown.

**Hon. Levinia Brown**: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. The member is correct. The RFP closed on December 7, 2007 but I don't seem to see how many had applied. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

Chairman: Thank you, Minister. Mr. Curley.

**Mr.** Curley: Mr. Chairman, I'll rephrase my question. Which airlines responded to the RFP #2007-52 which closed on December 7? Thank you.

Chairman: Thank you, Mr. Curley. Minister Aglukkaq.

**Hon. Leona Aglukkaq**: Mr. Chairman, those questions should be directed to the department responsible for the procurement process and that's Minister Brown. Thank you.

Chairman: Thank you, Minister. Minister Brown.

**Hon. Levinia Brown**: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. According to my briefing notes, I don't have that information; I just have the information on the procurement on the medical travel for RFP and the contract process. That's what it speaks about but it doesn't directly speak on how many airlines applied. I don't have that information right in front of me. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

Chairman: Thank you, Minister. Mr. Curley.

**Mr. Curley**: Thank you. Mr. Chairman, that information is important to the committee and I would urge the minister to bring that information as quickly as possible to the committee. This is quite an important part of the process and we need to know exactly who is participating in the RFP. Thank you.

**Chairman**: Thank you, Mr. Curley. Minister Brown.

**Hon. Levinia Brown**: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I could get that information from the department and I believe there were five airlines that were bidding. Thank you.

**Chairman**: Thank you, Minister. We're on Branch Summary. Health and Social Services. Treatment. Mr. Kattuk.

**Mr. Kattuk**: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I just needed more information from what I have been given or received from the department when I asked which airline was awarded for the Sanikiluaq medical travel. Which airline was awarded to serve the residents of Sanikiluaq? Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

Chairman: Thank you, Mr. Kattuk. Mr. Premier.

**Hon. Paul Okalik** (interpretation): Thank you, Mr. Chairman. (interpretation ends) We are in a difficult dilemma. The contracts have not been signed and they have until April 1, so we cannot disclose publicly the process in terms of the actual contracts at the moment. Once they are signed, as the minister committed to doing, they will be public.

So we're in a bit of a difficult situation. We made sure the process was fair and open; we gave everyone an opportunity to compete through the RFP. So that's all I can say at this point. Once they are signed within the next week and a half, by April 1, we will disclose that information. Hopefully we will get it sooner than that. (interpretation) Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

Chairman: Thank you, Mr. Premier. Mr. Kattuk.

**Mr. Kattuk** (interpretation): Thank you, Mr. Chairman. When do the contracts start? (interpretation ends) Is it April 1? Today is March 14. (interpretation) That's not very far from now, so the government must know. Why is it so late or why aren't they signed yet? Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

Chairman: Thank you, Mr. Kattuk. Mr. Premier.

Hon. Paul Okalik (interpretation): Thank you, Mr. Chairman. Yes, we are aware this, but we can't say anything in public at this time because they have not been signed. Once they have been signed, then we can make it public but if we try and say something about it now, we will be breaking our laws. We're trying to following the RFP process methodically and thoroughly, and ensure we take due consideration of public concerns at the same time. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

Chairman (interpretation): Thank you, Mr. Premier. Mr. Kattuk.

**Mr. Kattuk** (interpretation): Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I understand that they will definitely be signed by March 31. That's how I understand it; they have to be signed by March 31. This is not a question. It's just a comment. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

**Chairman** (interpretation): Thank you, Mr. Kattuk. Mr. Premier.

**Hon. Paul Okalik** (interpretation): It could be before March 31 because those airlines have until April 1 to sign the contract. It would be good if it's before March 31 so that we could release it but we're waiting for them at this time. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

**Chairman** (interpretation): Thank you, (interpretation ends) Mr. Premier. Branch Summary. Health and Social Services. Mr. Tootoo.

**Mr. Tootoo**: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I must say that I'm kind of surprised that this government is indicating that they don't know who put in tenders. They have evaluated them already, they have awarded, and they're just waiting for signed copies back. It's baffling to hear, "Well, we don't know who applied for the contracts in the Kivalliq," I know that they know; they issued contracts already. It just seems odd that they don't want to tell us anything about this; it just raises more questions.

Mr. Chairman, my question for the Minister for Health is: although the minister is deflecting everything to Community and Government Services, I mean it is Department of Health's contract; can the minister indicate if they had officials from the Department of Health involved in that process? Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

**Chairman**: Thank you, Mr. Tootoo. Minister Aglukkaq.

**Hon. Leona Aglukkaq**: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. First of all, no one's trying to deflect the process. A contract is only in place when two parties have signed. That's what you call a contract.

Right now, that contract is not complete because the signatures have not been signed. Once two parties agree to an agreement then we have a contract in place. That's what we're waiting for through this RFP process. Once we have that completed, we will be able to talk about the contract because the contract is only when two parties have signed an agreement. That's where it's at.

The process that I speak to is managed by CG&S and they're more familiar with the process of that RFP than I am, so this is why we refer to CG&S in terms of process. Yes, we were a party to it, but the RFP process, as technical as it is, is managed by the Department of CG&S. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

Chairman: Thank you, Minister. Mr. Tootoo.

**Mr. Tootoo**: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I think my colleague was asking how many people applied for it and not how many people were awarded the contract, and they don't even want to divulge that information.

As the minister indicated, they did have officials that participated in the process, so the minister should be familiar with what went along through that process. Can the minister indicate if there were any pre-meetings with all the interested parties prior to or after the RFP was issued so that if they had any questions and that, they would get clarification on things in regard to the contract that took place? Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

**Chairman**: Thank you, Mr. Tootoo. Minister Aglukkaq.

**Hon. Leona Aglukkaq**: Mr. Chairman, in terms of the process and managing the RFP process, again that question should be directed to the Department of CG&S that manages the RFP process. We don't manage the process; the contracting managers of CG&S manage the process. So CG&S should be answering that question. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

Chairman: Thank you, Minister. Minister Brown.

**Hon. Levinia Brown**: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. The information that was provided by me by my officials is on medical travel on RFP and contract processes, and this is dated

on March 6. And furthermore, I can't speak on the contract itself because it's not signed. The role of CGS' Procurement Department is to ensure an open and fair contracting and procurement process is followed.

In any RFP process, the issuing body, in this case it's the GN, has the duty to be fair to all proponents. The courts have upheld the duty of fairness consistently in many parts in past court examples. This public process was conducted in accordance with approved procurement policies and procedures, including public advertising and the NNI Policy.

An open, fair, and transparent process was followed:

- all proponents had access to the same information at the same time;
- all proposals were evaluated based on the same published evaluation criteria as outlined in the RFP document;
- RFP processes, while they contain language that allow for a process to be cancelled, can only be cancelled for objective business reasons only, otherwise the government is exposed to legal risk;
- modification of evaluation results were sent to the proponents;
- proponents were notified on January 25, 2008;
- draft contracts have been prepared by CGS and reviewed by Justice;
- draft contracts have been sent to Finance; and
- draft contracts have been sent to proponents for their feedback.

As of today, I don't want to be guessing but there were Kivalliq Air, Calm Air, Jimmy Onalik, Nunasi, Canadian North, and First Air. Those are the airlines that I know who we sent information to. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

Chairman: Thank you, Minister. Mr. Tootoo.

**Mr. Tootoo**: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. That doesn't answer my question at all. My question to the Minister of Health was if there was a meeting prior to or after the RFP was issued, where all of the proponents, if they had any questions, or concerns, or clarifications to be sought on the contract, on the RFP. Was there a meeting like that held and were any of her officials in attendance at those meetings? Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

**Chairman**: Thank you, Mr. Tootoo. Our Rule 70(2), allows the minister to refer the question to another minister and I believe that has been followed this morning. Minister Aglukkaq.

**Hon. Leona Aglukkaq**: Again, the process is managed through CG&S. If there were meetings of that nature, the Minister of CGS would respond to that. Thank you.

Chairman: Thank you. Minister Brown.

**Hon. Levinia Brown** (interpretation): We were following the procedures and policies accordingly, and we met together as Cabinet Ministers and we heard what we had to do at the same time. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

**Chairman** (interpretation): Thank you, Minister. Mr. Tootoo.

**Mr. Tootoo**: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I don't know why anyone here doesn't want to say they were at a meeting to answer questions and clarifications by any of the proponents. Maybe the Minister of Health can ask her deputy if she or any of her staff were at a meeting to clarify any questions in regard to the RFP after it was issued but before it closed. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

Chairman: Thank you, Mr. Tootoo. Minister Brown.

**Hon. Levinia Brown** (interpretation): Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I already mentioned the people involved in the contract, including CGS from I heard from my officials that were involved at the meeting with the airlines that were involved. I mentioned that six airlines were involved. If there were any other airlines that were involved, I apologize if I didn't mention any others.

I'm aware of whom CGS sat with, with the people involved in the Health Department. I wasn't there because as ministers, we are given reports from those meetings so I'm trying to tell you what I have heard from the staff. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

**Chairman** (interpretation): Thank you, Minister. Mr. Tootoo.

**Mr. Tootoo**: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. That still doesn't answer my question. So I would like to ask the Minister of Health if her deputy or any of his staff were at a question and answer type meeting with the proponents that applied to the RFP or the package and were interested in bidding for it to get any clarifications that they may have had in regard to it. That's all I'm asking. What's so hard about answering that? Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

**Chairman**: Thank you, Mr. Tootoo. Mr. Premier.

**Hon. Paul Okalik** (interpretation): Thank you, Mr. Chairman. (interpretation ends) Perhaps if I speak in English. My minister said that there was a meeting of all the proponents together to get the information, ask questions, and they were all given the same opportunity. (interpretation) Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

Chairman: Thank you, Mr. Premier. Mr. Tootoo.

**Mr. Tootoo**: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I think I understood that but my question was: was the Deputy Minister of Health or any of his officials in attendance at that meeting? Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

**Chairman**: Thank you, Mr. Tootoo. Minister Aglukkaq.

**Hon. Leona Aglukkaq**: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. The Deputy Minister of Health was not at that meeting. The RFP process consisted of representatives from CG&S, who managed the RFP process, and two weeks ago, as I mentioned in the House through Question Period, ED&T was part of that committee as well as Health, but my deputy was not at that meeting. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

Chairman: Thank you, Minister. Mr. Tootoo.

**Mr. Tootoo**: Which officials from the Department of Health were there? Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

Chairman: Thank you, Mr. Tootoo. Minister Aglukkaq.

**Hon. Leona Aglukkaq**: The Assistant Deputy Minister of Health, Dave Richardson. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

**Chairman**: Thank you, Minister. Mr. Tootoo.

**Mr. Tootoo**: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I would assume that the deputy minister and the minister would have been advised of what went on at that meeting by their assistant deputy minister.

Can someone indicate if, in fact, that the proponents were all told that the contract, as stated, starts April 1 and if there were any questions raised in regard to what would happen if any proponent that bid on it and was awarded it wasn't able to deliver the service as of April 1? Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

**Chairman**: Thank you, Mr. Tootoo. Minister Aglukkaq.

**Hon. Leona Aglukkaq**: Mr. Chairman, it's very difficult to answer questions when I'm being asked questions that are what if, what if, what if; we're going on the basis of assumptions here. I don't know what was discussed at that meeting. I do know, from what my ministerial colleague had mentioned, is there is a process in place. That process was followed; it was Q's and A's from the airlines and those were answered through the process.

In terms of any clarification they needed, everyone, from what she said, was treated fairly, was given the same information, the same questions, and so on. That process happened. I cannot answer questions on anticipated outcomes of decisions. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

**Chairman** (interpretation): Thank you, Minister. As I stated earlier, we must not ask hypothetical questions in the House. When we start the meeting, we always state Rule 77(2) and we need to ask questions following that. Mr. Tootoo.

**Mr. Tootoo**: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I don't think it was a hypothetical question. I was just wondering if the proponents were informed if there would be any penalties or if anything would happen in the event that they couldn't fulfill their commitments under their proposals on the effective date of the contract. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

Chairman: Thank you, Mr. Tootoo. Minister Brown.

**Hon. Levinia Brown** (interpretation): Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I have to review what is not here, even though it says I have to refer to the material handed out here. Let me put on my glasses (interpretation ends) the new contracts will cover all of Nunavut.

I'm sorry but I don't have the information that the member is seeking. I can only go with the briefing notes that I have. This is all that I have for today and nothing more has been given. I'm not going to say anything more that I am going to mislead the House because I don't want to have to do that. The contracts to be awarded are for three years with two additional one-year options to extend the contract. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

**Chairman**: Thank you, Minister. Mr. Tootoo.

**Mr. Tootoo**: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I would appreciate if the minister could provide that information and also assure us of what all of the proponents were told, if you want to call it the rules of the game and how it would be played and that, upfront that the government hasn't changed any of those rules throughout the process. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

**Chairman**: Thank you, Mr. Tootoo. Mr. Premier.

**Hon. Paul Okalik**: We would be putting ourselves in a liability situation if we were to change the rules in mid-process. So all of the processes were followed and everyone was given an opportunity to bid and respond to the RFPs. We're awaiting the signature of these contracts so that we can disclose them. So I think that we have explained what we could and what we can disclose at this point. (interpretation) Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

**Chairman** (interpretation): Thank you, Mr. Premier. Mr. Tootoo.

**Mr. Tootoo**: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I know that the RFP process is different than a tender process; it allows for objectivity and discretion on behalf the government to pick and choose what it wants and not necessarily going with the best price.

Can someone in the government assure us, as my colleague pointed out, to ensure competition, that that was a factor taken into account and that they don't just hide behind the fact that it was the best price? Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

**Chairman**: Thank you, Mr. Tootoo. Mr. Premier.

**Hon. Paul Okalik** (interpretation): Thank you, Mr. Chairman. (interpretation ends) Yes, we know that this is a difficult one for everyone and we would love to see more competition throughout the territory so that our constituents can pick and choose the best services and the best prices. So that's one of the primary reasons why we go through the RFP process - to allow everyone an opportunity to bid and succeed and allow for more competition throughout Nunavut. (interpretation) Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

Chairman: Thank you, Mr. Premier. Mr. Tootoo.

**Mr. Tootoo**: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I guess we will have to wait until our spring sitting to deal with this because the government doesn't want to seem to give us any information now.

As I mentioned to the motion earlier, Mr. Chairman, I would like to ask the minister or her officials to give us a rationale as to how they came up with an additional \$1 million for medical travel. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

**Chairman**: Thank you, Mr. Tootoo. (interpretation) The motion was already carried and I had allowed the members to speak to the motion. I allowed the members to speak when the motion was moved, so I will disallow your question because I already allowed questions to be posed at that time. Thank you.

(interpretation ends) Questions on H-7. Mr. Tootoo.

**Mr. Tootoo**: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. With that motion, I guess what I'm getting at is they increased the budget by \$1 million. When asked about it, they seemed to give an indication that they would speak to it with the officials and their chair of how they came up with that amount. I indicated that I still didn't feel it was an adequate amount, so I would like to hear how they came up with a new amount for medical travel. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

**Chairman**: Thank you, Mr. Tootoo. As I said, the motion was already carried and I gave us time to speak to the motion. I still declare the question as out of order. Mr. Tootoo.

**Mr. Tootoo**: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. It seems very pathetic that this government does not want to explain how they come up... I mean we're here to ask about the budget. They got a new amount in the budget now of, if I understand it correctly, \$44,959,000, so I would just like to figure out how they came up with that number. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

**Chairman**: The motion was already approved and like I said, it was discussed. I will use my discretion and recognize only those who have not asked questions to this page.

Order in the House, please. I reminded you that I will use my discretion. We're on Branch Summary. Health and Social Services Treatment. Total Operations and Maintenance, to be Voted. New figure as per amended. Mr. Curley.

**Mr. Curley**: Yes, I never did ask this question. Mr. Chairman, my question is to the Minister of Health. In evaluating the bids from those airlines, we're not sure how many participated and we're not 100 percent sure exactly which airlines participated yet, I would like to ask the minister: were the airlines clear when they teamed up as partners in submitting a joint tender? Was that also evident that there may be one bid from more than one airline?

So I would just like to get the minister to clarify for us because receiving two proposals when they're partnered together does not necessarily mean that competition is being applied if the contract is awarded to that joint proposal. Can the minister clearly explain that that may be happening in the Kivalliq region? Thank you.

**Chairman**: Thank you, Mr. Curley. You may not have asked this question but you already had your chance on this page. As I said, I was going to be using my discretion for members to ask questions. You used the ten minutes allotted time on the page and as I already made my ruling, I will not allow the question to be answered.

Treatment. Mr. Curley, are you challenging my ruling? If you are, I'll... Mr. Curley.

**Mr.** Curley: Mr. Chairman, you allowed me to ask a question and I did, and therefore, your ruling appears to be contradicting what you just provided me with.

I believe the minister heard the question and she should be given an opportunity as I was given the opportunity to ask a question without preconditions and the minister simply should respond because for me to exercise my privilege to challenge would be just a delay tactic right now. So I think the minister can simply indicate whether or not there were joint proposals submitted. Thank you.

**Chairman**: Thank you, Mr. Curley. As I mentioned, you appear to be challenging my ruling and I rise to report to the Speaker. We will have a short recess.

>>Committee recessed at 10:03 and resumed at 10:26

**Speaker** (interpretation): Thank you. Can you speak to the challenge to the ruling during the Committee of the Whole, Mr. Arreak.

Mr. Arreak (interpretation): Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I want to make a complaint.

>>Laughter

(interpretation ends) Mr. Speaker, I wish to report a matter which arose during proceedings in Committee of the Whole this morning.

I exercised my discretion pursuant to Rule 77 and limited members to one opportunity to speak to a page of the main estimates for a maximum of ten minutes.

I recognized the Member for Rankin Inlet North and provided him with an opportunity to speak. When provided with such an opportunity, he asked a question on a page on which he had previously asked questions.

I ruled the question out of order. The Member for Rankin Inlet North stated a disagreement with my ruling. I viewed this as a challenge to my authority as a Chair. I am reporting this matter to you to deal with as you see fit. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

#### Speaker's Ruling

**Speaker** (interpretation): Thank you, Mr. Arreak and Members. I have received the report from the Chairman of the Committee of the Whole. I note that the Chairman exercised his discretion pursuant to our Rules which are intended to provide for the efficient use of time and to maintain order in the House.

(interpretation ends) For that reason, I uphold the Chairman's ruling and find that the question posed by the Member for Rankin Inlet North was out of order and the Committee of the Whole will now resume it's deliberations with Mr. Arreak in the Chair. (interpretation) Thank you.

Sergeant-at-Arms.

**Chairman** (interpretation): We will resume. (interpretation ends) We're on page H-7. Branch Summary. Treatment. A Point of Order has been called. Mr. Tootoo.

#### **Point of Order**

**Mr. Tootoo**: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. My Point of Order is the fact that my question on how they came up with the total amount of medical travel and transportation budget was ruled out of order and I was told that the motion was already passed.

Mr. Chairman, my point is the motion was just for that \$1 million to be added to the Main Estimates of the Department of Health and Social Services under Treatment Branch. My question was on the total amount and not the \$1 million, so I would like to get a ruling on that, Mr. Chairman. I don't think that it should have been ruled out of order because the motion was under \$1 million and my question was on the total amount. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

**Chairman**: Thank you, Mr. Tootoo. As with my first ruling, he appears to be challenging my ruling, so I rise to report to the Speaker. We will take a few minutes break.

**Speaker** (interpretation): Thank you, Members. I would like to ask the Member for Uqqummiut and the Chairman of the Committee of the Whole, Mr. Arreak, to make his comments.

**Chairman** (interpretation): Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I want to make another complaint.

>>Laughter

(interpretation ends) Mr. Speaker, the ruling that I made in the committee was challenged by the Member for Iqaluit Centre. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

## Speaker's Ruling

**Speaker** (interpretation): Thank you, Mr. Arreak and members. Earlier in today's proceedings, the Member for Iqaluit Centre asked a question regarding the rationale for the motion moved by the Minister of Finance to increase the budget for the Department of Health and Social Services by \$1 million.

The question was ruled out of order by the Chairman on the basis that members had been provided with an opportunity to speak to the motion at the time it was made. I had the opportunity to view the proceedings as they were progressing.

I would like to add that when a motion is before the committee, the members are given the opportunity to speak to the motion and state the reasons as to why they support or do not support it. No member is required to speak to a motion.

The motion which was dealt with this morning is somewhat unusual in that the matter is now being discussed by the committee as part of the Main Estimates of the Health and Social Services. However, I note that the Member for Iqaluit Centre has already spoken to matters on this page of the main estimates and he is bound by the ruling pursuant to Rule 77 that members will be allowed to speak only once to this page for a maximum of ten minutes.

Accordingly, it is unnecessary for me to rule on whether or not the question was in order. (interpretation ends) The point is moot as the member has used his allotted time and is not allowed any further questions on the page currently before the committee. However, I remind the House that when the Committee of the Whole returns to page H-3 of the department's main estimates, all members will have a further opportunity to ask questions for a maximum of ten minutes. (interpretation) Thank you.

Sergeant-at-Arms.

I'm sorry, Members. You will resume your committee meeting from here.

Sergeant-at-Arms.

**Chairman** (interpretation): Thank you. We're back again. We're on (interpretation ends) Branch Summary. Health and Social Services. Treatment. (interpretation) Does the committee agree to bring in the minister's officials?

**Some Members**: Agreed.

**Chairman** (interpretation): Sergeant-at-Arms, please escort the witnesses in.

Thank you. (interpretation ends) Page H-7. Branch Summary. Treatment. Total Operations and Maintenance, to be Voted. New figure as per amended. \$138,236,000. Does the committee agree?

Some Members: Agreed.

**Chairman**: Thank you. Page H-8. Health Insurance Programs. Are there any questions on this page? Mr. Tootoo.

**Mr. Tootoo**: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. Maybe we will get some answers on this page, I hope. Mr. Chairman, can the minister indicate if the money that they pay individuals that take in boarders because the boarding homes are full comes through this program. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

**Chairman**: Thank you, Mr. Tootoo. Minister Aglukkaq.

Hon. Leona Aglukkaq: Yes, it does. Thank you.

Chairman: Thank you. Mr. Tootoo.

**Mr. Tootoo**: It felt good to get an answer. Thank you, Mr. Chairman. Can the minister indicate how that works if a client comes down let's say here to Iqaluit and is going to be boarded rather than going to the boarding home? What processes are in place or could you explain how that whole process works? Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

**Chairman**: Thank you, Mr. Tootoo. Minister Aglukkaq.

**Hon. Leona Aglukkaq**: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. When the boarding home is full, they make an arrangement for private accommodations for the patient. Thank you.

Chairman: Thank you, Minister. Mr. Tootoo.

**Mr. Tootoo**: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. Who makes those arrangements; is it the Department of Health or the individual? Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

Chairman: Thank you, Mr. Tootoo. Minister Aglukkaq.

**Hon. Leona Aglukkaq**: Mr. Chairman, the boarding home makes the arrangements, if they're full, to go to private accommodations and sometimes, the department also does that for the patient. Thank you.

Chairman: Thank you, Minister. Mr. Tootoo.

**Mr. Tootoo**: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I would like to ask the minister: are there any forms that are required to be filled out by anybody in that process? Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

Chairman: Thank you, Mr. Tootoo. Minister Aglukkaq.

**Hon. Leona Aglukkaq**: I don't know if there are any forms filled out. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

Chairman: Thank you, Minister. Mr. Tootoo.

**Mr. Tootoo**: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I would assume there has to be. If people get paid, they have to have some kind of paper trail. So I'm just surprised the minister doesn't even know if there are forms required to be filled out for that, so maybe if she can find out for us and let us know. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

Chairman: Thank you. Minister Aglukkaq.

**Hon. Leona Aglukkaq**: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. My employee in the audience said that there's a form that's filled out. Thank you.

Chairman: Thank you. Mr. Tootoo.

**Mr. Tootoo**: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. Can they indicate what's on that form? Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

**Chairman**: Thank you, Mr. Tootoo. Minister Aglukkaq.

**Hon. Leona Aglukkaq**: I can get that in a few minutes. I'm assuming the name, date of arrival and departure are on the form but I'll just get the note from my employee and share the rest if there's anything beyond that. Thank you.

**Chairman**: Thank you, Minister. (interpretation) Are you finished? Mr. Tootoo.

**Mr. Tootoo**: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I have a question but I want to get the response from the minister with the information first before I continue with my questions. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

**Chairman**: Thank you. (interpretation) Minister, do you wish to bring in a witness?

**Hon. Leona Aglukkaq**: Yes, Mr. Chairman. If members will allow, I'll ask Kevin to come here to answer what's on the form. Thank you.

**Chairman** (interpretation): Does the committee agree to bring the witness in?

**Some Members**: Agreed.

**Chairman** (interpretation): Sergeant-at-Arms, please escort the witness in.

Thank you, Sergeant-at-Arms. Minister, please introduce your witness.

**Hon. Leona Aglukkaq**: Kevin Compton and he will answer the question.

**Chairman**: Thank you, Minister. Welcome, Mr. Compton. Mr. Compton, do you have information as requested? Mr. Compton.

Nunavut Hansard

**Mr. Compton**: Yes, Mr. Chairman. The information that's listed on the travel warrant includes the name of the individual, the community in which they would be travelling from and to, the date of their appointment with the doctor, and the estimated date of return back to their home community.

**Chairman**: Thank you. Mr. Tootoo.

**Mr. Tootoo**: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I think that's the travel form. I'm just wondering for the boarders. Are there any forms that they have to fill out and what information goes on there? That's what I was getting at and I'm sorry if I didn't make that clear. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

Chairman: Thank you. Minister Aglukkaq.

**Hon. Leona Aglukkaq:** I'll get Kevin to answer that. Thank you.

**Chairman**: Thank you. Mr. Compton.

**Mr. Compton**: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. The only form that has to be filled out by the person travelling is the travel warrant as completed by our travel personnel that's making the travel arrangements for the individual. All the other documentation that's required is completed by the boarding home.

Chairman: Thank you. Mr. Tootoo.

**Mr. Tootoo**: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I'm just wondering if the boarding home would receive or handout and receive some type of confirmation to the people that are taking on that boarder as far as enabling them to get paid. Is that correct? Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

Chairman: Thank you, Mr. Tootoo. Minister Aglukkaq.

**Hon. Leona Aglukkaq**: I'll get Kevin to answer that.

**Chairman**: Thank you. Mr. Compton.

**Mr. Compton**: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. The information that's completed by the boarding home is then passed on to our Department of Finance for payment, which would give the name of the individual, where they stayed, and the length of their stay. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

Chairman: Thank you. Mr. Tootoo.

**Mr. Tootoo**: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I guess I'm glad to find out where that comes from now. The point that I want to make is it was mentioned yesterday that some of the people who are taking in boarders, and I know it's the practice that's just been started in the last two years, are getting, over certain amounts, taxed on it.

Could the minister or officials ensure that whoever, if it's the boarding home, is making individuals that are taking in boarders aware that that could be deemed as taxable income and that they would get taxed on it? I don't believe that that's happened to date. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

**Chairman**: Thank you, Mr. Tootoo. Minister Aglukkaq.

Hon. Leona Aglukkaq: I'll get Kevin to answer that.

Chairman: Thank you. Mr. Compton.

**Mr. Compton**: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. When the individuals are paid, it's the requirement by the Canada Revenue Agency that anybody who receives income has to be issued an information slip, and therefore, once the information slip is issued, then it has to be reported to the Canada Revenue Agency as taxable income. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

Chairman: Thank you. Mr. Tootoo.

**Mr. Tootoo**: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I realize that but I mean the people who are taking in the boarders don't know that ahead of time. I just want to make sure that the department could commit to making sure that those individuals that are taking in boarders are aware of that prior to them agreeing to take in boarders. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

Chairman: Thank you, Mr. Tootoo. Mr. Compton.

**Mr. Compton**: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. It is my understanding that the Department of Finance has taken on the responsibility to notify people that they will be issued T-slips after receiving income. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

Chairman: Thank you. Mr. Tootoo.

**Mr. Tootoo**: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. That doesn't help those people. I mean, the Department of Finance doesn't find out until after they have done it.

What I'm trying to get at is that those individuals are made aware of that fact prior to them taking in boarders because, for some people, they may know, "If I'm going to get taxed on this, the \$50 that I get is going to turn into less than that and I'm going to have to pay on it at the end of the year," that may affect their decision on whether or not to take on a boarder.

My question was: would the department commit to making sure that people, when they're asked if they want to take in a boarder, are made aware that it would be deemed as taxable income and that they would be getting a slip from Finance after it was processed? Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

**Chairman**: Thank you, Mr. Tootoo. Minister Aglukkaq.

Hon. Leona Aglukkaq: I'll get the deputy to answer his question. Thank you.

Chairman: Thank you, Minister. Mr. Campbell.

**Alex Campbell** (interpretation): Thank you, Mr. Chairman. (interpretation ends) Yes, the department will commit to preparing an information pamphlet that we can share with the clients who are boarding at the boarding homes. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

**Chairman**: Thank you, Mr. Campbell. Thank you, Mr. Tootoo. We're on page H-8. Branch Summary. Health Insurance Programs. Total Operations and Maintenance, to be Voted. \$54,228,000. Does the committee agree?

Some Members: Agreed.

**Chairman**: Thank you. Go back to Page H-3. Department Summary. Health and Social Services. Detail of Expenditures. Total Operations and Maintenance, to be Voted. New figure due to amendment. \$252,388,000. Does the committee agree? Mr. Tootoo.

**Mr. Tootoo**: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. As the Speaker mentioned in his ruling, maybe this is the opportunity to get an answer to my question that I raised earlier - if they could indicate how they came up with that extra \$1 million for the budget. It doesn't say specifically in the motion where it's going other than the Treatment Division, so if I could get a clarification on that. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

**Chairman**: Thank you, Mr. Tootoo. Minister Aglukkaq.

Hon. Leona Aglukkaq: I'll have the deputy minister answer that. Thank you.

**Chairman**: Thank you, Minister. Mr. Campbell.

**Alex Campbell** (interpretation): Thank you, Mr. Chairman. (interpretation ends) The extra \$1 million that we're asking for to be approved by the members is as a result of fuel price increases that occurred last fall. We're taking that into consideration as part of the projections for next year for a total of \$44 million for medical travel. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

Chairman: Thank you, Mr. Campbell. Mr. Tootoo.

**Mr. Tootoo**: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I know the minister, herself, stated before that the best and most accurate number they could use to project their budgets on were actuals, the latest numbers that they have.

Based on the Supplementary Appropriation Bills that are before us, I think there's another around \$4.5 million for medical travel and that's still about \$2 million or \$3 million less than what they have in their budget now for the 2008-09 year. So I'm just wondering if I can get an explanation: how come it's different than what she had indicated that the best way to go is with what they spent from the previous year, which they know now to be about \$49 million? Why are they budgeting less? Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

Chairman: Thank you, Mr. Tootoo. Minister Aglukkaq.

**Hon. Leona Aglukkaq**: Mr. Chairman, during the first five days of Committee of the Whole, I had indicated that we would be increasing the medical travel for 2007-08 by \$4 million. I'll say that for the record again and I'll get the deputy to elaborate a little bit more on the question. Thank you.

**Chairman**: Thank you, Minister. Mr. Campbell.

**Mr. Campbell** (interpretation): Thank you, Mr. Chairman. (interpretation ends) The current projection for 2007-08 is to spend about \$46 million for medical travel. Based on that information, we have made some calculations including the \$1 million that we're asking for, the \$44 million revised budget for medical travel would be sufficient for the next budget year.

We're also taking into consideration some of the discussions that we've had this morning regarding the scheduled medical contract. We are hopeful that through that process, there will actually be some savings to the government as a whole on initiating that process with the airlines. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

Chairman: Thank you, Mr. Campbell. Mr. Tootoo.

**Mr. Tootoo**: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. When they went back and re-looked at their numbers, was that just something that the Department of Health did by itself or was there any involvement from the Department of Finance as well? Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

Chairman: Thank you, Mr. Tootoo. Minister Aglukkaq.

**Hon. Leona Aglukkaq**: I will get my deputy to answer.

Chairman: Thank you. Mr. Campbell.

**Mr.** Campbell (interpretation): Thank you, Mr. Chairman. (interpretation ends) Yes, we do have Finance as a resource to our department. We also have financial experts in the department that provides advice to us on some of the trends that have been happening in the medical travel. So we also use the Department of Finance as a sounding board to provide the necessary advice for the department. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

**Chairman**: Thank you, Mr. Campbell. Mr. Tootoo.

**Mr. Tootoo**: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I'm just wondering, from its review, if the \$1 million amount is the amount that the department brought forward that they needed an increase for. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

**Chairman**: Thank you, Mr. Tootoo. Minister Aglukkaq.

**Hon. Leona Aglukkaq**: The increase for the \$1 million for fuel increase was calculated by our department in consultation with Finance. Thank you.

Chairman: Thank you, Minister. Mr. Tootoo.

**Mr. Tootoo**: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I understand it was calculated there, but was that the number that was brought forward both by the department and by Finance for approval? Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

**Chairman**: Thank you, Mr. Tootoo. Minister Aglukkaq.

**Hon. Leona Aglukkaq**: Yes, that was my answer. Yes.

Chairman: Thank you, Minister. Mr. Tootoo.

**Mr. Tootoo**: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. The deputy indicated they feel it's sufficient but it's still a few million dollars less than what they actually spent this year. Given the track record of the medical travel numbers and costs going up - when you look at 2005-06, I think it was \$39 million and now we're close to \$46 million for next year, and we have spent close to \$50 million this year - would the minister commit to providing regular quarterly reports on the medical travel to the Members of the Assembly? Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

**Chairman**: Thank you, Mr. Tootoo. Minister Aglukkaq.

**Hon. Leona Aglukkaq**: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. In my letter to the members dated March 5, I committed to doing that. Thank you.

**Chairman**: Thank you. (interpretation) Are you finished? (interpretation ends) Page H-3. Total Operations and Maintenance, to be Voted. New figure due to amendment. \$252,388,000. Does the committee agree?

**Some Members**: Agreed.

**Chairman** (interpretation): Thank you. (interpretation ends) Are you agreed that the Department of Health and Social Services is concluded?

Some Members: Agreed.

**Chairman**: Thank you, Minister. Thank you, Mr. Campbell. Thank you, Mr. Compton. (interpretation) Do you have any closing remarks? Minister Aglukkaq.

**Hon. Leona Aglukkaq**: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I would like to thank my deputy minister, as well my assistant deputy minister and Kevin for their support, at the same time, the staff at Finance and HSS, with this process and I would like the members for their questions. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

**Chairman**: Thank you, Mr. Tootoo. Minister Tapardjuk.

**Hon. Louis Tapardjuk** (interpretation): Let us find it. I will have Roy answer that question, Mr. Chairman.

Chairman: Thank you, Minister. Mr. Green.

**Mr. Green**: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. Based on the January 31, 2008 variance report delivered by the department, they projected a budget of \$7,856,000 for March 31 and their actual projected expenditures were \$15,021,583. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

Chairman: Thank you, Mr. Green. Mr. Tootoo.

**Mr. Tootoo**: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. So they have pretty much doubled what they had originally budgeted. Is that correct and where did the rest of the money come from because there's only \$4 million of it? Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

**Chairman**: Thank you, Mr. Tootoo. Minister Tapardjuk.

**Hon. Louis Tapardjuk** (interpretation): Mr. Green will also answer that question.

**Chairman**: Thank you, Minister. Mr. Green.

**Mr. Green**: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. Based on the variance report, the department was projecting that approximately \$5 million or \$6 million will be accessed in Compensation and Benefits. Those monies will offset some of the additional costs to fund the agency nurses, unfortunately due to the department's inability to recruit at the full staffing level. The remaining \$4.3 million was required to offset the projected expenditures for March 31, 2008. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

**Chairman**: Thank you, Mr. Green. Thank you, Mr. Tootoo. Page 7. Treatment. \$8,725,000. Does the committee agree? Mr. Tootoo.

**Mr. Tootoo**: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. That's how it's done on the first part but on this part, the \$4,425,000 for medical travel, I just want to get a confirmation on what the total projected budget amount for medical travel would be with that supplementary appropriation. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

Chairman: Thank you, Mr. Tootoo. Minister Tapardjuk.

Hon. Louis Tapardjuk (interpretation): Mr. Ma will answer that question.

Chairman: Thank you, Minister. Mr. Ma.

**Mr. Ma**: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. If my calculations are correct, it is \$46,524,000 with the supplementary amount included. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

**Chairman**: Thank you, Mr. Ma. Mr. Tootoo.

**Mr. Tootoo**: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I know in the revised 2007-08 estimates, in the main estimates, it was \$44 million and if we're giving another \$4.4 million, it is \$48 million or \$49 million. I'm just wondering if they can explain the difference there. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

**Chairman**: Thank you, Mr. Tootoo. Minister Tapardjuk.

Hon. Louis Tapardjuk (interpretation): Mr. Ma will also respond to that, Mr. Chairman.

Chairman: Thank you, Minister. Mr. Ma.

**Mr. Ma**: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I believe the Deputy Minister from Health and Social Services indicated the reasons during the Committee of the Whole on Bill 23.

Even though the budget for 2008-09 is lower than the budget we're going to be reporting now for 2007-08, there are a number of reasons why. First of all, he indicated that with the new medical travel contracts that are about to be issued, there would be some projected cost savings in that area. The second reason would be that the department has worked hard to control its expenditures and they believe they have made some progress in that respect. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

Chairman: Thank you, Mr. Ma. Mr. Tootoo.

**Mr. Tootoo**: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. Sorry, I didn't clarify my question. I wasn't asking about the difference for next year's amount.

The revised amount in the main estimates for 2007-08 is \$44,674,000 and then if you add this \$4,425,000 on there, that makes it a little over \$49 million. Mr. Ma indicated earlier that the amount was \$46 million, so there's between \$3 million and \$4 million difference, and that's what I was looking for a clarification on. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

Chairman: Thank you, Mr. Tootoo. Minister Tapardjuk.

Hon. Louis Tapardjuk (interpretation): Mr. Ma will also answer that question.

Chairman: Thank you, Minister. Mr. Ma.

**Mr. Ma**: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. There are two components in the medical travel budget. The first component has to do with what we call the client medical travel component. That number with the supplementary bill here of \$4.4 million would bring that total to \$46,524,000, which is the number indicated earlier to the member.

In addition, there's a second component which takes into account travel by the medical professionals within the Department of Health and Social Services. That number I believe is \$2,282,000 and that then brings us to the number that the member is referring to. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

Chairman: Thank you, Mr. Ma. Mr. Tootoo.

**Mr. Tootoo**: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. With all the flying in and out of agency nurses, is that in that \$2 million or is that included in the Contract Services? Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

**Chairman**: Thank you, Mr. Tootoo. Minister Tapardjuk.

Hon. Louis Tapardjuk (interpretation): Mr. Ma will also respond to that question.

Chairman: Thank you, Minister. Mr. Ma.

**Mr. Ma**: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I believe that amount comes out of the Contract Services part of the budget for Health and Social Services. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

**Chairman**: Thank you, Mr. Ma. Page 7. Treatment. \$8,725,000. Does the committee agree?

Some Members: Agreed.

**Chairman**: Total Treatment. \$8,725,000. Does the committee agree?

Some Members: Agreed.

**Chairman**: Total Department. \$10,225,000. Does the committee agree?

**Chairman**: Page 8. Environment. Operations and Maintenance. Wildlife Operations. Not Previously Authorized. -\$450,000. Does the committee agree?

**Chairman**: Thank you. Total Capital Planning and Technical Services. I'm sorry. Capital Planning and Technical Services. -\$1,585,000. Does the committee agree?

Some Members: Agreed.

**Chairman**: Thank you. Total Capital Planning and Technical Services. -\$1,585,000. Does the committee agree?

**Some Members**: Agreed.

**Chairman**: Total Department. \$5,685,000. Does the committee agree?

# Bill 22 – Engineers & Geoscientists Act – Consideration in Committee

**Chairman**: Welcome. I would now like to ask Minister Okalik of the Department of Justice to make his opening remarks. Minister Okalik.

**Hon. Paul Okalik** (interpretation): Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I am very pleased to have reached this historical point. I would first of all like to recognize an individual who is an engineer and who helped us in the NWT and Nunavut, Natalie Plato. I would like to welcome her first.

#### >>Applause

Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I wanted to introduce her first. I am very pleased to introduce this bill. (interpretation ends) The bill will replace the *Engineers Geologists and Geophysicist Act* with a new Act that updates terminology and references to the name of the governing association. The definitions of professional engineering and professional geoscience will be changed for greater clarity and consistency with national guidelines.

We share with the NWT one association that governs these professions, the Association of Professional Engineers, Geologists and Geophysicists of the Northwest Territories and Nunavut.

In both the current *Nunavut Act* and Bill 22, the legal body created by NWT legislation is the specified body responsible for the self-regulation of professional engineers and geoscientists who work in Nunavut. It is the *Northwest Territories Act*, however, that sets out the powers of the legal body and that sets out how the association regulates the professions. The *NWT Act* also gives the association the power to act in Nunavut, but this power is subject to Nunavut laws.

In late 2006, the NWT passed a new Act to change the names of the Act and the governing association, and to update the law of self-governance for these professions. Once it is brought into force, the new *NWT Act* will:

- set the powers of the association to manage its affairs, including the powers to hold property or money, make by-laws, and elect its governing council;
- set up the mechanics for the registration of members, licensees, members in training, and permit holders, and provide for the payment of fees to NAPEGG for registration;
- set out rules respecting various aspects of professional practice, including the use of titles Professional Engineer and Professional Geoscientist, and the use of stamps;
- set out the procedures for the discipline of members, including the resolution of some disputes by mediation; and
- authorize NAPEGG to continue to regulate professional engineers and geoscientists in Nunavut.

Both Nunavut and Northwest Territories have had the benefit of working with NAPEGG on this new legislation, and in fact, it is NAPEGG that initiated the process for legislative change in the two territories after tracking legislative development elsewhere in Canada.

I would like to thank the committee for the consideration of this bill and I am open to receiving comments and questions. (interpretation) Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

**Chairman** (interpretation): Thank you, Minister. Before we proceed, we need to take a break, so we will take a five-minute break.

**Hon. Paul Okalik** (interpretation): Thank you, Mr. Chairman. With me on my right as you know is my Deputy Minister with the Department of Justice, Markus Webber, and on

my left as you also know is our Legislative Drafter, Thomas Druyan. They will be here with me today. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

**Chairman** (interpretation): Thank you, Minister. Welcome. Does the Chairman of the Standing Committee *Ajauqtiit* have any opening comments? Mr. Mapsalak.

**Mr. Mapsalak** (interpretation): Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I am very happy that I will probably be home tonight. I would like to thank our very capable researcher, Leetia, and our interpreters who can make things much clearer.

(interpretation ends) Mr. Chairman, I am pleased to have the opportunity to speak to Bill 22, the *Engineers and Geoscientists Act*. This new Act will replace the *Engineers*, *Geologists and Geophysicists Act* and will develop a regulatory body that will allow engineers and geologists to practice in Nunavut and to discipline any misconduct that may take place.

Mr. Chairman, similar to the Workers' Compensation Board, Nunavut and the Northwest Territories share the association that governs professional engineers and geoscientists in the two territories. This body is called NAPEGG, the Association of Professional Engineers, Geologists and Geophysicists of the Northwest Territories and Nunavut. I would like to take this opportunity to thank NAPEGG for its written submission to the standing committee on this bill. NAPEGG was in support of the bill.

Mr. Chairman, the standing committee supported the bill at the clause-by-clause stage of its review. A minor amendment was made to add a missing provision.

Mr. Chairman, this concludes my opening remarks. The committee recommends the passage of the bill to all members. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

**Chairman**: Thank you, Mr. Mapsalak. The proclamation will instruct the Chief Electoral Officer to issue a writ of election to the returning officer of each community where an election is to be held and to issue the writ of election on September 22, 2008.
