Executive Summary

The Departments of Transportation and Infrastructure Nunavut (TIN) and Community Services (CS) are pleased to present the 2023-24 CGS Grants and Contributions Results Report. As part of the Government of Nunavut's Re-organization of 2025, CS is responsible for the entirety of this report except for the Technical Professional Studies and the High School Award Programs (pages 11 and 12) which are the responsibility of TIN.

The CGS grants and contributions program provided basic operational and capital funding to non-tax-based municipalities, as well as important programming and operational funding to territorial organizations and individuals whose work provides significant social, cultural, or economic benefits to Nunavut.

The CGS Grants and Contributions Program was designed to empower and strengthen municipalities, individuals, and non-profit organizations by providing financial support for initiatives that foster community development, address societal challenges, and promote innovation and sustainability. This program represents the CGS commitment to building resilient communities and driving positive social change. In 2023-24 the terms and conditions through which the Department administers these funds were detailed in the Department's nine (9) Grants and Contributions policies containing a total of thirty-six (36) schedules outlining the funding streams available in each policy.

The CGS Operations and Maintenance Grants and Contributions Programs Funding for 2023-2024 fiscal year totaled \$79,319,000 or 26.6% of the total Operations and Maintenance Budget.

The Department also had several capital contribution programs that are essential for the health and prosperity of municipalities. These programs provide financial means for infrastructure development, economic growth, and community improvement, ensuring that local governments can meet the evolving needs of their residents. By investing in their communities, municipalities can create vibrant and resilient places where people want to live, work, and invest, thereby fostering sustainable, prosperous, and thriving communities. In 2023-2024, the department's Main Estimates total \$79,319,000 million across five key investment themes encompassing educational scholarships, municipal support, community-driven initiatives, and sports and recreation programs, all aimed at fostering sustainable development and enriching community life for Nunavummiut.

Five Investment Themes

- 1. **Scholarship and Award Programs:** To increase educational access, promote academic excellence, and empower individuals to achieve their full potential while fostering diversity, community engagement, and responsible leadership.
- 2. **Municipal Block Funding:** To support local governments in enhancing service delivery, infrastructure development, and community well-being, while promoting fiscal responsibility and sustainable growth.



- 3. **Municipal Training and Support:** To equip local governments with the necessary resources and expertise to enhance their operational efficiency, governance practices, and overall service delivery to the community.
- 4. **Municipal Proposal Based Programs:** To empower municipalities, individuals, and non-profit organizations to drive positive change and enhance the quality of life within their communities.
- 5. **Sport and Recreation Programs:** To promote active and healthy lifestyles, foster community engagement, and support the development of sporting talent while enhancing access to quality facilities and programs for all members of the community.





Figure 2: Scholarships and Awards Investment




Sport and Recreation Scholarship Program

Technical Professional Studies Program

This program provides financial support to Nunavut Land Claim Beneficiaries (NLCB) and Nunavut residents to pursue post-secondary technical studies in fields such as Engineering, Informatics, Community Planning, Business Studies, and college programs in Fire Fighting, Training and Prevention, and Land Administration. The Technical Professional Studies Scholarship (TPS) is administered on an application basis, prioritizing beneficiaries. A call for proposals is issued annually through media advertisements and Public Service Announcements.

High School Computer Award Program

The department supports the goal of Article 23 of the Nunavut Land Claim Agreement (NLCA) regarding Inuit employment and the need for education and training. The department's High School Computer Award Program recognizes that academic success in the field of Sciences and Mathematics encourages students to pursue further academic studies that may lead to a successful professional and technical career of choice. In 2023-24, the department awarded 19 students in with computers as a result of their hard work and dedication.



Municipal Block Funding

The Department of Community and Government Services Operations and Maintenance Budget included several Municipal Block Funding Programs.

These are direct allocation programs that the department administers to the territory's local governments. Municipal block funding programs play a pivotal role in the allocation of financial resources within local governments. These programs represent a significant mechanism by which municipalities distribute funds to various departments, projects, and community initiatives. By pooling resources into cohesive blocks, municipalities can streamline the funding process, promote transparency, and ensure that financial allocations align with their broader development goals. Municipal block funding is a critical element in the quest for efficient and equitable resource distribution, ultimately shaping the quality of life and services for residents.

Municipal block funding programs serve several important purposes in the context of local government and community development. These programs are designed to provide financial support to local municipalities in a flexible and versatile manner.



Grant in Lieu of Taxes

The Government of Nunavut (GN), under the authority of the Financial Administration Act, may pay grants to cities, towns, villages, and hamlets to compensate for the municipal services provided to GN buildings, as cities, towns, villages, and hamlets cannot tax a higher authority. The department's Grant in Lieu of Tax Program provides tax-based communities with a grant equal to the property taxes that a private citizen or company would pay for a similar property (the City of Iqaluit is the only tax-based community in Nunavut). The amount changes as the government acquires new properties.

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

Senior Citizens and Disabled Persons Tax Credit

The City of Iqaluit, the sole tax-based municipality in the territory, submits a comprehensive application supported by property tax notices for eligible recipients. Funding is disbursed upon receipt and acceptance of the application.




Figure 7: Senior Citizen and Disabled Persons Tax Relief Expenditures 2021/22-2023/24

Municipal Funding and Water and Sewage Subsidy Programs

The Municipal Funding Program (MFP) allocates basic operational funding to each municipality in Nunavut based on the scale and scope of their operations and includes the following programs and services:

- General Works
- General Government Services
- Protective Services
- Transportation
- Building Maintenance
- Utilities
- Planning and Lands Administration



The Water and Sewage Subsidy Program (WSSP) supports municipal corporations to assist with the provision of water and sewage services and to subsidize costs and reduce user fees for these services.




Figure 8: MFP and WSSP Expenditures 2021/22-2023-24

Municipal Training and Support




Figure 9: Municipal Training and Support Investment 2021/22-2023/24




Community Search and Rescue Organization

These programs provide financial assistance to support community-based search and rescue functions and may be accessed on an application basis by eligible applicants.

In 2023-24, Community Emergency Response Plan (CERP) Training was provided through the MTO to six municipalities for 76 participants. The CERP training is a three-day course that provides municipalities with an all-hazards approach framework to assist in planning and organizing during an emergency. The training provides communities with the tools and knowledge necessary to respond to any potential emergency. Communities learn how to identify risks and the probability of occurrence using a Hazard Identification and Risk Assessment (HIRA).

In addition, the department provided Search and Rescue Training through the Municipal Training Organization (MTO) in six communities for a total of 54 participants.









Fire Prevention Strategy

The department provides financial support promoting public awareness to reduce fire losses and support municipal fire departments through programs that increase their capacity and professionalism in delivering fire prevention programs in Nunavut communities.


During the 2023-24 Fiscal Year, the department issued a contribution agreement to MTO to facilitate and deliver training to fire departments across Nunavut. A total of 156 successful applicants throughout the region received instruction in ten courses.







Municipal corporations and non-profit organizations are eligible for funding for expenses related to planning and hosting traditional sport and Inuit games events.




Figure 16: Sport and Recreation Inuit Games Support Funding 2023-24

Figure 17: Team Nunavut Athlete Development Contribution Recipients 2023-24




Territorial Organization Support

Territorial Organization Support provides financial assistance for non-profit, volunteer led organizations to pursue to delivery of:

- Tournaments, camps, and clinics intercommunity territorial champions, training camps, and development clinics for athletes.
- Capacity Development training for coaches, officials, and recreation leaders.
- Operational Support administrative expenses like insurance and audits.



Funds supported over 2752 participants from 21 communities in 2023-24 to participate in events such as summer day camp training, soccer territorials, and Canada Games training camps.



Community Support

The department recognizes the importance of intercommunity events and leadership training initiatives and provides financial support to municipal and nonprofit organizations towards planning and implementation.
